
Let's label this photo so that we can recognize some to the features of this iconic building:



#1 The bronze statue on top of the Capitol is called, *The Statue of Freedom*; she stands 19' 6" tall and weighs 15,000 lbs! She has been there since the middle of the Civil War, 1863, the same year that the Emancipation Proclamation was signed.

She stands on a globe that has a banner reading, *E Pluribus Unum*, which is Latin for:

This is the lobby of the Capitol. It has many famous statues for visitors to see and interesting history to learn about it. You can look up into the dome at an amazing painting! The dome is the highest point on the Washington, DC skyline.

This building is where federal laws are made by Congress.

#2 Three American flag poles are on the front west side of the Capitol. It is the job of several people to raise and lower flags on these poles all day long. Close to 350 flags everyday are flown on these three poles, for about 30 seconds each!

Why, you ask? Any American can order a flag and fill out a form requesting a flag be flown in honor of someone or some occasion. The flag is then packaged and sent to the person who requested it with a certificate of authenticity.
