



"Next time I'll eat my ice cream slower, then maybe I won't have to burp," he said. "Silly Ben," Abby giggled.




WHY AND HOW

How is a star born?

A star is a big ball of plasma that is formed from a cloud of dust and gas.

Sometimes particles of dust and gas float by each other in space without anything happening. Other times gravity clumps these clouds together into compact substances. The particles begin bouncing off of each other, creating friction and heat. Eventually, the heat becomes so intense that it creates a nuclear reaction which releases a massive amount of energy and light. The resulting substance is a star.




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URSA MAJOR AND URSA MINOR: Always visible in Northern Sky

Not all constellations can be seen by everyone on Earth. Because of the way Earth spins on its axis people who live in the northern hemisphere can see different constellations than people in the southern hemisphere.



Ursa Major, the "big bear", and Ursa Minor, "little bear", are two of five constellations that can be seen all year long from Earth's northern hemisphere because they are so high in the sky.



The famous constellation the Big Dipper makes up a large part of Ursa Major. Can you see where stars within the "great bear" form to make what looks like a ladle, or water dipper? Similarly, the Little Dipper makes up a large part of Ursa Minor.

CASSIOPEIA, THE QUEEN ALWAYS VISIBLE IN THE NORTHERN SKY


Cassiopeia was a very vain queen. She thought she and her daughter Andromeda were more beautiful than the sea nymphs, and she would brag about it. When the sea nymphs complained to Poseidon, the god of the sea, he sent a monster named Cetus to their kingdom. Queen Cassiopeia and King Cepheus were forced to sacrifice their daughter to the monster. But just before she was eaten, a hero named Perseus saved her. All of these characters are constellations you can see in the sky.



Eventually, the gods were so frustrated with Cassiopeia's vanity that they hung her upside-down in the sky, as a reminder to everyone else to not be boastful. We can see the constellation Cassiopeia as a "W" shape in the sky.

ANDROMEDA VISIBLE IN THE NORTHERN SKY DURING FALL

After she was freed from the sea monster, Cetus, Andromeda kept her parents' promise to Perseus and married him. She left her country to live with her new husband who later became the king of Tiryns and Mycenae. The goddess Athena placed the image of Andromeda among the stars as a reward for keeping her parents' word.



Perseus, the hero, is known for beheading the snake-headed Medusa, to save the princess Andromeda from the giant sea monster.


PERSEUS

VISIBLE IN THE NORTHERN SKY DURING WINTER

The location of Perseus lies in the main path of the Milky Way and can easily make out the human figure with a triangular body, legs and hands. In one hand, he appears to be holding the weapon, while in the other he appears to be holding Medusa's head.

It is also home to the annual Perseid's meteor shower which is visible every August.

Cinco de Mayo!

May 5th is a celebration of the Mexican Army's victory over France. In 1862, France sent 2000 troops into Mexico in an attempt to take it over. Though Cinco de Mayo is celebrated in the country of Mexico where the battle took place, there is even a bigger celebration in the United States.

In the mid 1800's Mexico was in trouble. It was a bankrupt country. This was unfortunate for Benito Juarez. He took over the presidency in 1861, and had to make some difficult choices. One of those choices was not paying off money he owed to European countries such as Britain, Spain, and France.

Not willing to lose their money, all three countries sent ships to Mexico. They demanded what was owed to them. Britain and Spain ended up making a deal with Mexico. France decided to take advantage of the weak country. Napoleon the Third sent an armed fleet of ships to the Mexican city of Veracruz. President Juarez was forced to flee to the north.

France was sure they would win. They marched 6000 men to the small city of Puebla de Los Angeles. The President of Mexico was not willing to let his country go so easily. He rounded up 2000 loyal men and sent them to Puebla as well. The Mexicans were out numbered and out gunned. They fought all day. When it was over, the French had lost more than 500 soldiers and were forced to retreat. The Mexican's had lost only 100 men. It was a small victory, but a victory that boosted the rest of the country.

The war would last six more years. With help from the United States, who had only just ended the Civil War, France was defeated. Mexico was once again in control of their country.


Cinco de Mayo is mainly a Mexican-American celebration. Without the help from the Americans, the war would have lasted longer and the may have been different. Once the American Civil War ended, President Lincoln immediately sent troops to help the struggling Mexicans. It was a show of support and friendship. Years later, when Pearl Harbor was bombed, Mexicans crossed the border to help fight with their neighbors.

Cinco de Mayo is celebrated in the Mexican state of Puebla. They enjoy military parades and other festivities. For most of Mexico, however, it is a day like any other.

The United States, particularly in places with large Mexican-American populations, celebrates the day with more excitement. Most people in the United States see Cinco de Mayo as a holiday recognizing Mexican independence.

Cinco de Mayo is celebrated with special Mexican music like mariachi bands. Children make piñatas filled with candy and toys. Special food is served, and often the night ends with fireworks. In Los Angeles the celebrations attract hundreds of thousands of people. The green, white, and red colors of the Mexican flag are proudly on display. There are carnivals and festivals that last multiple days.

Cinco de Mayo is a time-honored tradition celebrating friendship and freedom.

a game for 2 players Need: 2 dice, colored pencils


Players take turns to roll the 2 dice and color an array created by the two numbers rolled.

For example, if a player rolls 3 and 5, they would color a 3x5 block or a 5x3 block.

The grid on the right shows what it might look like after the first player rolls 4 and 3 and the other player rolls 6 and 2.

The game ends when a player can't draw the array for the numbers they roll. The other player is the winner.

*Extra: Students can write the repeated addition sentence for their array


