1. _____
This legislation, passed by Congress in 1890, joined the western Territory and the Panhandle.
2. _____
This was the area between the North Fork and the South Fork of the Red River. The U.S. Supreme Court decided it belonged to Oklahoma.
3. _____
Ranchers and squatters in No Man's Land (also called The Public Land Strip) tried to establish it as this separate district. But due to its small population, they failed.
4. _____
This is the term for an outsider who takes advantage of an opportunity for his own profit. Because he was not an Oklahoman, people used it to refer to territorial governor George Steele.
5. _____
This was the original name of a town just south of Oklahoma City. It was later renamed for an employee of the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad.
6. _____
This was the name of the teacher training institution in Edmond. It would later become the University of Central Oklahoma.
7. _____
This was the original name of the educational institution in Stillwater. In 1957, it would become a state university.
8. _____
Although several other communities wrangled for the honor, Governor Steele chose this city as the first capital of Oklahoma.
9. _____
This group was appointed to negotiate with the tribes. Its chairman, for whom it was named, worked methodically to purchase their surplus lands.
10. _____
This was the only remaining Indian land that had not been allotted by 1906.
