This new motor led to the invention of the automobile. It was fueled by a refined petroleum product called gasoline.

2. _____

This was the first commercial oil discovery in Oklahoma. It had to be capped for two years because local markets could not use all the oil it produced.

3. _____

This small town grew from a population of 200 to more than 4,000 because of the discovery of oil nearby.

4. _____

These were general laborers. Although there were a few skilled positions available, most workmen did this all-purpose job.

5. _____

This oilfield, discovered on Creek lands south of Tulsa, produced more than 325 million barrels of oil by the 1980s.

6. _____

This is a form of petroleum that contained less sulphur. It was ideal for refining into gasoline and kerosene.

7. _____

This was the name for the drilling area in Healdton. It got its name because of its low-cost, shallow wells.

8. _____

These were shares of any tribal funds collected from the sale of oil, minerals, or lands. Each member of the Osage Tribe was given one.

9. _____

This was an enormous tree in Pawhuska where the Osage conducted business. Many of the sales brought extraordinary prices.

This was an interstate network of roads that crossed Oklahoma. It started in St. Louis and stretched south and west to Texas and New Mexico.
